Groundbreaking Ceremony Celebrates Pending Improvements to the West Branch Susquehanna Headwaters

On Thursday, November 12, WBSRC members attended the Barnes & Tucker Lancashire #15 Treatment Plant Groundbreaking Ceremony near Northern Cambria. Approximately 30 people turned out to watch as state and local officials broke ground for the \$11 million treatment facility that is slated to go online in the fall of 2011. The plant will treat up to 10 million gallons a day of polluted water from the abandoned Lancashire #15 deep mine, which blew out in 1970 and caused a major fish kill on the West Branch Susquehanna River. Since that time,



the discharge has been treated and pumped to Blacklick Creek in the Ohio River drainage. With the opening of the new treatment facility, this water will be returned to the Susquehanna River drainage where it is expected to clean up to 35 or more AMD-impacted miles of the West Branch and add much needed water to the basin. According to the DEP, this water will be used to make up for consumptive use by farmers and industry further down in the basin, thus impacts will be seen as far downstream as the Chesapeake Bay. From the Old Town Sportsman Association...

The Old Town Sportsman's Association (OTSA) started a fish stocking program after the Barnes and Tucker mine operation in Cambria County began discharging AMDimpaired water that all but eliminated the fishery in the Clearfield West Branch of the Susquehanna River in the early 1970's.

Over the decades the river has improved mostly due to environmental law changes, municipal waste improvements and the unfortunate loss of industry along its watershed. OTSA started building a renewed interest in the river with annual trout stockings and in 1975 with a youth fishing derby that still continues today. In 2005 the PA Fish and Boat Commission listed the West Branch from Hyde downriver to below the town of Clearfield as an approved "trout waters" making it part of their annual spring and fall trout stocking program.

As public perception of the condition of the river began to improve many local residents re-

mained skeptical - demonstrating a need to complete a water quality analysis of the river. Talk of such a project reached Trout Unlimited and the West Branch Susquehanna Restoration Coalition and a partnership was formed with OTSA.

On August 12, 2009 the almost 2-year study was made public by the West Branch Susquehanna Restoration Coalition summer interns Aaron Furguiele, Lori Smith, Zack Bassett and Zeb Buck who presented an in-depth study that looked at the health of the river's ecosystem at 14 locations. A crowd of over 60 people as well as 3 local newspapers and I local TV station gathered at the Elk's Club in downtown Clearfield to hear the study's results. This status of the river report will go a long way in documenting the improvements of the River and also provide information regarding what needs to be done in the future.

The report is a crucial source for the ever changing challenges that face the future of the West Branch with its recreational and manufacturing uses.

Babb Creek Removed from Impaired Streams List



The Babb Creek Watershed Association celebrated the removal of Babb Creek from the DEP's list of impaired streams on Saturday September 12th with a ribbon cutting cere-

mony. Over the last 25 years more than \$6.8 million dollars and inkind services from local, state, and federal sources has been dedicated to the recovery of this creek.

This delisting follows the 1999 removal of five miles of Pine Creek below its confluence with Babb Creek from the state's list of impaired streams.
